

Storytelling Training

Telling stories may sound like a straightforward project—after all, you're likely to have dozens of personal stories about the issues on which you work. There are, however, important up-front considerations that will save time and energy and ensure that the stories you tell reinforce your strategic communication goals!

Step 1: Get the Facts

Pre-Story Planning	
What is the story you are trying to tell (subject/theme/situation) and the message/lesson you are hoping to convey?	
Who is your target audience?	
What is the ideal format and length?	

Step 2: Interview Yourself

Collect Information—What, When, Who, How and Why.

How Do You Fit Into This Story?	
Who are you?	
What do you care about?	
Why does the thing you care about matter to your family/community?

What Is/When Was the Moment Where a Conflict, Issue, Or Change Occurred?		
What was the trigger (the moment when an action began)?		
How did the trigger affect the people in the story?		
What was the outcome of the conflict, issue, or change?		
What changed and why?		
What happened to the people in the story?		
How did the outcome affect others?		
What are the lasting impacts?		



What Is The Story's Takeaway Or Ask?		
What action do you want to take place as a result of you telling your story?		
What visual(s) could be used when telling the story?		
Step 3: Practice Telling Your	Story	
Practice telling your story using the fo	llowing outline:
